


Lifetime Achievement Award

Burt's influence on Michigan botany over his long career has been tremendous. His teaching, with Herb Wagner for many years, of the famous "Woody Plants" course at the



University of Michigan is legendary, and influenced the lives of many hundreds of people. It's not uncommon, even to this day, when I am talking to people in other fields in Ann Arbor (lawyers, doctors, dentists, and more) and they find out I am a botanist at the University of Michigan, they mention that they took "Woody Plants", and tell me how that course altered their lives and made them look at the natural

world around them differently.



Perhaps even more influential is *Michigan Trees*, co-authored with Herb Wagner, a model for an information filled natural history book. Not simply a compilation of trees and how to identify them (itself a valuable contribution), this book places trees into their historical and ecological contexts with readable, fact-filled chapters interesting to a very broad range of people. If people interested in the outdoors in Michigan have only one plant book, it will be *Michigan Trees*!

But this was by no means Burt's only contribution to dendrology books. More tuned to the professional, Burt was a primary author on the highly regarded book *Forest Ecology*. This book is now into a fourth edition! And Burt is continuing, even well into retirement, to contribute in a huge way to Michigan botany. He is actively working on – and getting close to finishing – a much needed book on Michigan shrubs.

Though I don't want (or need) to delve into Burt's numerous scientific papers published in a range of highly regarded journals, suffice it to say that in these works we find immense contributions to understanding Michigan landscapes, natural areas, and rare organisms. Burt has authored or co-authored papers on the Jack Pine ecosystems unique to northern Lower Michigan – and their relationship to Michigan's most famous bird, the Kirtland's Warbler. He has extensively surveyed other Michigan ecosystems, from floodplains to dry oak forests. He has published on using the landscape ecology approach in conservation as well as forest ecology. His output in scientific papers alone is over 100.

Burt's contribution has also been in training generations of graduate students, many of whom have stayed in Michigan to further his ideals, whether working for the State, in a University setting, or in the private sector. It sometimes seems like all the people at the Michigan Natural Features Inventory (MNFI) are Burt Barnes' students!

Burt has freely given of his knowledge by way of a number of programs to the Michigan Botanical Club; every one that I have attended has been fascinating. He has been most helpful to other University resources as well – plant specimens to the University Herbarium, help with committees and reviewing at the Matthaei Botanical Gardens and Nichols Arboretum. Very recently, Burt gave powerful and cogent testimony to the legislature about the so-called "anti-biodiversity" bill.

Burt is one of the giants of Michigan botany, and it is hard to think of anyone more deserving of this recognition.

Grants Awarded in 2013

MBF 2013-01: \$692.11 to Emily Sprengelmeyer, M.S. candidate, Northern Michigan University. Emily's research project focused on *Capnoides sempervirens* a biennial forb typically found on rocky outcrops and in areas of recent canopy-altering fire, however its seeds are often found throughout the forest seed bank. The project involved examining the role of the soil seed bank within a metapopulation framework and the role of seed dispersers in determining seed distribution patterns for the species.

MBF 2013-02: \$1110.20 to Dr. Binny Girdler, Kalamazoo College, Kalamazoo MI to map and analyze the spread of Spotted Knapweed into the habitats of two threatened dune species, Pitcher's Thistle and Lake Huron Tansy. A student of Dr. Girdler assisted in the analysis as part of her Senior Individualized Project, a graduation requirement at K College.

MBF 2013-03: \$1657.60 for MBC Joan Robb Student Foray Awards and additional sponsored students. The Huron Valley, Southeastern, and White Pine Chapters each applied for a Joan Robb Award. In addition to the Joan Robb sponsored student, the Huron Valley, Southeastern, and White Pine chapters each individually funded and sponsored a second student to the Foray. Each of these chapters also applied to MBF and was awarded grant money to fund additional students. The Huron Valley and Southeastern chapters each received a grant to fund a third student and the White Pine chapter was awarded a grant to fund a third and fourth sponsored student.

MBF 2013-04: \$455.00 to Dr. Dennis Riege, University of Maryland University College, Middletown, RI. In 2010 Dr. Riege began a long-term research project at Estivant Pines, Michigan's largest remaining old-growth White Pine Forest located near the tip of the Keweenaw Peninsula. This MBF grant funded his 2013 field work. Dr. Riege has submitted his work to *The Michigan Botanist* for possible publication. See "MBF Featured Grant Recipient" below.

MBF 2013-05: \$675 to The Michigan Botanist to support the publication of the special Ed Voss issue, *The Michigan Botanist*, Vol. 51, No. 1.

MBF 2013-06: \$300.00 to HVC (Irene Eiseman) for best student authored botanical projects presented at the Southeast Michigan Science Fair.

MBF 2012: \$800.00 to Fenner Nature Center, Lansing MI. This was the balance of a 2012 grant received by the Center in support of an educational butterfly garden.

MBF Featured Grant Recipient

Dr. Dennis Riege was awarded a Michigan Botanical Foundation grant to assist in his ongoing research of five Upper Midwest forests. As part of his permanent-plot studies of these five forests, Dr. Riege sampled and identified the ground vege-



tation in transects of white pine stands at Estivant Pines in 2010 and at the Huron Mountain Club Reserve in 2011. Both sites are in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The 2013 MBF grant allowed Dr. Riege to finalize the identification and sampling of the

ground vegetation at Estivant Pines (see photo for a glimpse of Estivant Pines). He has deposited his voucher specimens from the two Northern Michigan sites in the Northern Michigan University herbarium and submitted an article to *The Michigan Botanist* detailing his findings. The article will be companion paper to one published in 2011 (*The Michigan Botanist* 50: 107 – 117) on forest demography of the two sites. The following is an excerpt from Dr. Riege's report to MBF.

"The forest floors of the sites were dominated by species common to mature upland conifer-hardwood stands, such as Maianthemum canadense, Dryopteris carthusiana, and Acer saccharum seedlings. Ground species richness was much less at Estivant than at the Hurons, with tree seedlings at Estivant more frequent than herbs. Thuja occidentalis seedlings dominated much of the Estivant forest floor and seemed to have an inhibitory effect, decreasing species richness where present. The only nonnative plant identified in the survey of these forest preserves was Veronica officinalis at Estivant Pines. Species composition indicated that deer herbivory at the sites was relatively light compared to other regional studies. These initial vegetation samples along marked transect lines will serve as benchmarks for future studies. Monitoring of vegetation dynamics will, for example, track changes in the canopy gaps that are common in an Estivant plot and the effects of beaver cutting in a section of the Huron stand, as well as follow general latesuccessional patterns in undisturbed areas."

- 1. Call to Order MBC President, Judy Kelly, called the meeting to order at 10:10 a.m.
- Agenda approval Irene Eiseman moved to approve the May 25, 2013 MBC minutes/Treas. report. Bev Walters seconded, motion carried.
- 3. **Robert's Rules of Order** President Kelly reminded the Board of procedures.
- 4. Announcements

A. *Updated president's email list:* List was passed around for updating. President Kelly announced that her new email address is

- A. Web Master Aaron Fown expressed his happiness with the website with very few glitches. He mentioned that the website is incompatible with the search engine Explorer 8 and to please update to a newer version of Explorer. Larry Nooden asked about security and Aaron said it was very good. He also said that he will teach 10 people how to edit their chapter information on the website. Richard Fowler asked about registering for the foray on the website. Aaron said that he can do this including a payment method if desired.
- B. Nominations Sarah Nooden explained the duties of the nominations committee which include telephoning/e-mailing to each chapter to see who is still interested in their Board position for the term beginning 2015. Sarah said that she was willing to continue to be chair but would need extra help this year due to her travels. The committee needs to be formed before 2/1/2014. <u>Judy K. said that she would send</u>

out an e-mail to see if anyone would like to serve on this committee.

- C. Corresponding Secretary Mary Danforth was not present but spoke to Judy K. about when the *Arisaema* should be published this year due to the foray being in July. It was agreed that a June issue would be possible depending on the lodging reservation requirements. This prompted a discussion of the need of a spring Board meeting. It was decided that an April 12th Board meeting would be needed to certify the slate. Judy will contact the MEC office in Lansing for the winter and spring meeting.
- D. The Michigan Botanist Michael Huft (replacing Todd Barkman) had spoken to Todd who indicated that there were enough articles but does not know the details yet. Appreciation was expressed to Michael for taking on the position of editor. (introduction of Michael to follow)
- Treasurer Bob Kelly e-mailed the treasurer's report to everyone for reference. He expressed that the current balance is fine however \$1000 still needs to go to The Michigan Botanist and \$2000 to the business manager so he will have to withdraw money from money market funds to meet those needs. The trend is moderately increasing expenses with decreasing revenue so we will continue to experience shortfalls until we address this. Bob said there were questions regarding the initial investment amount of the Smith Fund and needed to calculate its value at the time it was invested along with funds from the MBC into the 2005 \$40,000 CD. Earnings from 2005 to date were calculated by the % contribution of the Smith and MBC funds at the time the 2005 CD was established. He suggested that when the CD matures we separate it from the MBC funds.

6. New Business

A. Constitution & bylaws committee - Michael Huft offered to join the constitution committee as he had non-profit law experience. He was welcomed on board. Tony expressed how digital communication may not be considered in the constitution and will need to be expressed in the constitution. Michael agreed. Larry N. expressed a concern with our tax #. Bob K. said that a form & letter for the state expressing our status as a non-profit is now needed. Discussion followed on the state requirement for a permanent address such as a PO Box address or a drop-box. Bob K. moved that the

treasurer be authorized to expend funds to set up a PO Box address for the MBC and it be in Ann Arbor, Aaron Fown seconded. Discussion followed. It was agreed that we may want to investigate an actual address with Mailbox etc. or something similar. Bob K. revised his motion that he would investigate the type of Box to set up and have an on-line vote. Motion passed.

7. Old Business

- A. Report on back issues of <u>The Michigan Botanist</u>-Judy K. announced that she has issues of <u>The Michigan Botanist</u> in the trunk of her car for anyone who wishes to have them. Discussion regarding the older <u>Michigan Botanist</u> being electronically available but for now hard copies are available. Archives are in the Herbarium Library. <u>The Michigan Botanist</u> was explicitly NOT copyrighted. Larry N. mentioned that not all PDF's are searchable.
- B. **Mission Statement** The mission statement/aims committee is comprised of Sarah & Larry Nooden, Ruth Hart and Tony Reznicek who worked on the proposals and passed copies including the rationale to everyone. Discussion regarding the great lakes region being addressed and the word "native" to distinguish ourselves from garden plants. Also, exotics/invasives are studied as they pertain to native plants. It was mentioned that the mission statement does not need to be part of the constitution but a separate entity which can be altered as necessary. Sarah Nooden said that she would write a final statement and we will have an e-mail vote. It was suggested that the term "wise use" in the aims could be revised to say "stewardship". Tony R. said that the constitution committee will take the Aims suggestions under advisement.
- C. Re-publication of Winter Wildflowers Larry N. said there is a need for updating the publication of Winter Wildflowers. The committee proposed to use the Smith fund (as the family indicated). It was discussed how the booklet would engage amateur botanists with an interest. The Michigan Botanical Club name will be prominent. Judy K. asked if it could be a special supplement or special issue to/of The Michigan Botanist. This was supported by Larry N. and Tony R. as this could help cover costs. The question of copyrighting or open-access of the new supplement was asked. Michael Huft pointed out that there are selective copyrights. Aaron Fown said that there are other avenues that could be researched as well.

October 12, 2013 Minutes (Continued)

Larry and Aaron suggested that the original be digitally formatted. Questions and comments were made regarding scientific names and appropriateness. Judy Kelly asked Larry Nooden to write an article in the spring *Arisaema* regarding ideas/photos, etc. on The Winter Wildflower publication. He agreed.

- D. Status of Red Cedar Chapter Irene Eiseman said that everyone who was a member in 2012 will get copies of The Michigan Botanist. Irene felt that historical documents could be found and archived in the Bentley Library. Larry N. suggested asking the Wesselmans and Peebles.
- E. Search for new editor for The Michigan Botanist Michael Huft — Judy K. referred to the bylaws regarding the Editor-in-Chief to be a 3yr term and the need to fill this post. Judy Kelly welcomed Michael Huft and asked him to tell us about himself. He said that he received a Ph.D. in Botany from the University of Michigan in 1979 and spent the next 13 years working as a tropical botanist, mostly at the Missouri Botanical Garden and the Field Museum. He went to law school in 1992 and practiced most of the time since then in a large Chicago firm in the area of non-profit law. He has been working part time for the last four years and has gradually renewed his activities in botany. He went on to say that when he read that the Club was looking for a new editor, he first contacted Judy K. by email, then spoke with her over the phone. After that he had a conversation with Todd Barkman. He is a member of the Indiana Native Plant & Wildflower Society, and at the beginning of this year rejoined the Michigan Botanical Club as a member of the Southwestern Chapter (He had been a member of the Huron Valley Chapter in the 70s, 80s, and early 90s). Larry N. moved that Michael Huft be brought on board as the Editor of The Michigan Botanist as soon as possible. Tony R. seconded. Discussion followed as Michael expressed his thoughts on the possibility of broadening the appeal of The Michigan Botanist by including articles on the greater Great Lakes area. Tony R. said that Ed Voss had that idea in mind also -- as an educational component. Sarah N. expressed that biographies also may be of interest. Larry N. mentioned that the Smiths' legacy be recognized in the journal as well. Richard F. also supported the idea of broadening the appeal without diluting the journal's professional stature. Motion carried.

5. Committee Reports

- a. Webmaster Aaron Fown: 40-50% more visitors (5-8 people) <u>Aaron will do a workshop on editing after the meeting</u>. Larry asked if we need PHP security. Aaron said the present system is needed to access our information and affirmed the necessity for this system and his satisfaction of the system.
- b. Corresponding Secretary Mary Danforth: Mary emailed a report to Judy Kelly. Costs for Spring Newsletter @ \$1,000. Mary asked that descriptions of foray field trips be in to her by May 15. The Foray Edition would be out May 30. The April edition would not have all of the registration information in it. All articles

- should be in by March 15th for the April spring edition. The regular edition will have the directory, foundation info, treas. report, M.botanist info, two sets of minutes, preview of foray. Richard Fowler moved that we have two newsletters, the second to include foray registration forms. Pam Laureto seconded. Motion carried.
- c. The Michigan Botanist: Judy reported that Michael Huft met with Todd and Issue #4 is complete. He has manuscripts he is currently reviewing. Michael is currently looking into legality of putting on-line regarding copyright issues. Discussion followed regarding recent changes in the law regarding posting. 3. Committees

- a. Field trip leaders & evening speakers Lynn Steil, Larry Nooden & Tony Reznicek: Tony announced that our speaker for Friday evening is Bill Rose from MTU.
